

DESCRIPTION

The TDSL31.0 series are 10 mm character seven segment low current LED displays in a very compact package.

The displays are designed for a viewing distance up to 6 m and available in high efficiency red. The grey package surface and the evenly lighted segments provide an optimum on-off contrast.

All displays are categorized in luminous intensity groups. That allows users to assemble displays with uniform appearance.

Typical applications include instruments, panel meters, point-of-sale terminals and household equipment.



Fig. 1 - Forward Current vs. Ambient Temperature




Fig. 2 - Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Angular Displacement




Fig. 3 - Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Fig. 6 - Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current




Fig. 4 - Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Ambient Temperature




Fig. 7 - Relative Intensity vs. Wavelength





Fig. 5 - Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current/Duty Cycle







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Fig. 8 - TDSL31..



PACKAGE DIMENSIONS in millimeters



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Ozone Depleting Substances Policy Statement

It is the policy of **Vishay Semiconductor GmbH** to

1. Meet all present and future national and international statutory requirements.
2. Regularly and continuously improve the performance of our products, processes, distribution and operating systems with respect to their impact on the health and safety of our employees and the public, as well as their impact on the environment.

It is particular concern to control or eliminate releases of those substances into the atmosphere which are known as ozone depleting substances (ODSs).

The Montreal Protocol (1987) and its London Amendments (1990) intend to severely restrict the use of ODSs and forbid their use within the next ten years. Various national and international initiatives are pressing for an earlier ban on these substances.

Vishay Semiconductor GmbH has been able to use its policy of continuous improvements to eliminate the use of ODSs listed in the following documents.

1. Annex A, B and list of transitional substances of the Montreal Protocol and the London Amendments respectively
2. Class I and II ozone depleting substances in the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in the USA
3. Council Decision 88/540/EEC and 91/690/EEC Annex A, B and C (transitional substances) respectively.
